Description:

This is a multimedia class and open to students who have the skills to produce video pieces and audio stories with Smartphone technology, independently. While immersing yourself into the theatrical life of NYC, you will learn to perfect the art of the interview **and** hone your reporting skills. This course will delve deep into the most important components of the interview; such as human psychology, preparation, relationship building, how to gain access and the treatment of sensitive subject matter. Learn interview best practices: researching interview subjects, preparing questions, conducting meaningful interviews and practicing active listening. The goal of the course is to arm you with the confidence and knowledge to be fully prepared to conduct a successful interview with anyone and under any situation.

Learning Objectives

In this course, students will:

- Demonstrate awareness of journalism's core ethical values
- Delve deeper into interview techniques and story development
- · Prepare to conduct interviews with insight and care
- · Identify and access story sources and subjects
- Adapt interview styles for different purposes and platforms
- Negotiate conditions for effective and ethical interviews
- \cdot Work ethically in pursuit of truth, accuracy, fairness, and diverse perspectives
- Arm yourselves with the experience to take your interviews to the next level

Course Structure: The course will include lectures, discussions, media screenings, visits to The Public Theater and other performance venues. **DOING THE READING, VIEWING OR LISTENING IN THIS CLASS IS CRUCIAL TO YOUR FINAL GRADE**. *Your contributions will have an enormous impact on how rich and rewarding classroom discussions are.*

***Note: The lecture schedule may be revised on short notice to take advantage of guest speaker opportunities and/or the schedule of the theater. The class will require some flexibility with time. For instance, class may start later or last longer to accommodate a performance.

ATTENDANCE: Students are asked to attend every class session because the course is deeply discussion-based and experiential. There will be rare opportunities to "make up" these kinds of classroom activities, so absences will directly impact the student's grade. Please email me **in advance** if you are unable to attend.

- □ "My Journey Into Becoming a Critic" Students will produce a Q&A with an intro with an arts critic. (**100 points**) Due July 27 at 11am.
- Showtime" Students will produce a piece surrounding the pre-performance rituals, feelings, emotions of the cast and crew of Shakespeare in the Park. (150 points) August 10 at 11am.
- □ Joe's Pub— Students will produce a piece that focuses on a staff member at the Public Theater music venue. (100 points) August 15th at 11 am.

Your interview assignment is titled "Showtime" and each of you are to delve deep inside the worlds of cast and crew <u>before</u> a performance.

For this assignment you will use your mobile phone to portray your subject's story, through photography and text <u>or</u> sound.
